Citizens' Oversight Committee Annual Report on Measure "E" & Measure "T" **General Obligation Bonds**

Letter from the Chairperson

As Chairperson of the Citizens' Oversight Committee, I am pleased to take this opportunity to brief you on

the progress of the . - . ties General Obligation Bonds. Since our last newsletter in October, 2007, much has happened. First of all the

last of the Measure "E" (2002) \$60 million was expended and our Annual Financial and Performance Audits for Measure "E" and "T" (2006) were completed and reviewed by the Committee.

I am happy to say that all funds were spent appropriately and complied with the bond resolutions and the Education Code Section 15278 et seq. The Committee also reviewed and approved the Annual Reports (on pages 2 and 3 of this newsletter) for Measure "E" and Measure "T" as required by Ed Code.

Under the Education Section 15278, no bond funds can be expended on projects not listed on the Projects List (Exhibit A of Resolution 1053 and Exhibit 1 of Resolution 1608). The proceeds cannot be expended for administration or teacher salaries or operational expenses.

Absolutely no Measure "E" or "T" funds have been spent on the new support facilities, the Professional Development Service Center or the Professional Development Academy. The District utilized funds received from

the revenue generated from the City of Hemet Redevelopment Agency agreements.

Measure "E" and Mea...no Measure "E" or "T" funds have been spent on the District's support facilities, the Professional Development Services Center or the Professional Development Academy. ??

> In February, the District made a presentation to Standard & Poor's, the bond rating agency. The District retained an "A" rating matching its previous rating despite the dismal economic outlook and bond market. The second series of bonds, \$40 million, were issued on March 18, 2008. \$100 million of the \$149 million Measure "T" bond authorization has now been issued.

> The major new construction projects are Rancho Viejo Middle School on Cawston Avenue next to Fruitvale Avenue and the second and third phases of Tahquitz High School consisting of two classroom wings, pool, stadium and food service facilities.

> Other projects in motion include the well, water tank and library project at Cottonwood School; the design of the Hemet High School addition which is a major addition of classrooms and a theater, as well as major site improvements, and finally the master plan and conceptual plan of the Acacia Middle School addition and renovation project.

Many smaller projects and a site acquisition are in the works including improvements at West Valley High School,

> --- Little Lake Elementary School and Winchester Elementary School. The "Project Status Report" included at the end of this newsletter summarizes the progress.

We are happy to have a full eleven (11) member committee with one member added since October to replace an outgoing member. We will, however, need to replace Anna Marie Dalbey and Thomas Green who have fulfilled their two terms. The Governing Board is soliciting new members (see article on page 6).

This report contains the Annual Report certifications, financial and project status summaries and other general information about Measure "E" and Measure "T".

Annual Report Citizens' Oversight Committee for Measure E Fiscal Year 2006/2007

The Citizens' Oversight Committee has reviewed the financial expenditures of Measure E proceeds on a quarterly basis and has reviewed all actions related to the compliance with Education Code 15728. The expenditure reports that the Citizens' Oversight Committee has been provided; provide the site, activity, vendor, and amount of each payment. The most recent expenditure reports reviewed by the Committee relative to the reporting period were June 21, 2007 and January 17, 2008. These reports have been made available for public review.

- The District has complied with Article XIII A, and Education Code 15728 at Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution as follows:
- The first series of Measure E bonds (Series A) of \$23 million were issued in June 2002. Proceeds were spent only for construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including furnishings and equipping of school facilities, or acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities as identified in the projects list.
- The second series of Measure E bonds (Series B) of \$15 million was issued in June 2003. Proceeds were spent only on construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities including furnishings and equipping of school facilities on acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities as identified in the projects list.
- The third series of Measure E bonds (Series C) of \$10 million were issued in June 2004. Proceeds were spent only on construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities including furnishings and equipping of school facilities on acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities as identified in the projects list.
- The fourth series of Measure E bonds (Series D) of \$6 million were issued in May 2005. Proceeds were spent only on construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities including furnishings and equipping of school facilities on acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities as identified in the projects list.
- The fifth and final series of Measure E bonds (Series E) of \$6 million were issued in February 2006. Proceeds were spent only on construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities including furnishings and equipping of school facilities on acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities as identified in the projects list.
- No proceeds were spent on teacher salaries, administrative salaries or on operational expenses.
- An independent audit was prepared for the year ending June 30, 2007, complying with the provisions of the Education Code and approved by the Citizens' Oversight Committee. The audit referenced here was reviewed by the Citizens' Oversight Committee on January 17, 2008. The audit was previously approved by the Governing Board of the Hemet Unified School District and is available for public review on the District's webpage www.hemetusd.k12.ca.us at the Citizens' Oversight Committee link. Copies are also available at the District Office.
- The District has made efforts to maximize the bond revenues by implementing cost-saving measures such as negotiating cost reduction in professional fees for architectural design, use of construction management value engineering services, reuse of plans, incorporation of water and energy conservation measures such as use of reclaimed water and use of drought tolerant plants within the school plans. Through the cooperation and partnership with contractor, Bogh Construction, and our Construction Manager, douglas e. barnhart, the District saved \$1 million on the site grading of Tahquitz High School.
- 10) The Committee has been provided necessary and adequate technical assistance from District staff in order for the Committee to fulfill its legal obligations and purpose. District staff welcomes Committee questions and comments. You can contact Richard Beck at rbeck@hemetusd.k12.ca.us. Staff has provided regular project status reports and expenditure reports quarterly to the Committee and agenda items as requested by the members.
- 11) The agendas, minutes, and reports have been made available to the public and are posted on the website maintained by the District (www.hemetusd.k12.ca.us).
- 12) The Committee has complied with the Ralph M. Brown Act (Brown Act) a public meetings act, by having formally scheduled meetings with agendas duly noticed, open to the public, with minutes taken and posted on the District's webpage under the Citizens' Oversight Committee. Meetings are scheduled on a quarterly basis. Special meetings may be scheduled and will follow the provisions of the Brown Act.
- 13) The Committee has toured various sites and has reviewed the progress reports on the status of all projects.

Annual Report Citizens' Oversight Committee for Measure T Fiscal Year 2006/2007

The Citizens' Oversight Committee has reviewed the financial expenditures of Measure T proceeds on a quarterly basis and has reviewed all actions related to the compliance with Education Code 15728. The expenditure reports that the Citizens' Oversight Committee has been provided; provide the site, activity, vendor, and amount of each payment. The most recent expenditure reports reviewed by the Committee relative to the reporting period were September 20, 2007 and January 17, 2008. These reports have been made available for public review.

The District has complied with Article XIII A, and Education Code 15728 at Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution as follows:

- 1) The first series of Measure T bonds (Series A) of \$60 million were issued March 1, 2007. Proceeds were spent only on construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities including furnishings and equipping of school facilities on acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities as identified in the projects list.
- 2) No proceeds were spent on teacher salaries, administrative salaries or on operational expenses.
- 3) An independent audit was prepared for the year ending June 30, 2007, complying with the provisions of the Education Code and approved by the Citizens' Oversight Committee. The audit referenced here was reviewed by the Citizens' Oversight Committee on January 17, 2008. The audit was previously approved by the Governing Board of the Hemet Unified School District and is available for public review on the District's webpage www.hemetusd.k12.ca.us at the Citizens' Oversight Committee link. Copies are also available at the District Office.
- 4) The District has made efforts to maximize the Measure T bond revenues by implementing cost-saving measures such as negotiating cost reduction in professional fees for architectural design, use of construction management value engineering services, reuse of plans, incorporation of water and energy conservation measures such as use of reclaimed water and use of drought tolerant plants within the school plans, and competitively bid bond issuance to obtain lowest interest rate ((4.3699 Measure T Series A). The District saved \$14 million for Phases 2 and 3 of Tahquitz High School and Rancho Viejo Middle School.
- 5) The Committee has been provided necessary and adequate technical assistance from District staff in order for the Committee to fulfill its legal obligations and purpose. District Retains "A" Bond Rating & Issues Second Series

Despite the decline in home construction, prices of existing homes, slow down in the economy and the lending crisis, the Hemet Unified School District retained its "A" bond rating on the \$40 million Series B bond issuance from Standard & Poor's on February 29, 2008.

The District had previously received an "A" rating for the \$60 million Series A bonds issued in March, 2007.

District officials were concerned that the downturn in housing and economic growth and employment would impact the rating but were not surprised by the "A" rating due to the solid financial management and oversight of the District.

The \$40 million bonds were competitively bid on March 3, 2008 with the low bid being from UBS for an effective interest rate of 5.06%. The rate is higher than the District's previous issuances, but is excellent considering the bond market problems. Also, rates are expected to increase over the next several months due to inflationary pressures.

The District closed the \$40 million bond sale on March 18, 2008. The District has now issued \$100 million of the \$149 million General Obligation Bond authorization approved by the voters in November, 2006. □

Committee to Review Board Approved Acacia Middle School Master Plan

The Citizens' Oversight Committee will review the Acacia Middle School Master Plan at their May 15, 2008 meeting.

In January, the Governing Board had a master plan design competition to select an architect and the basic schematic theme for Acacia Middle School. Dr. Philip Pendley and the Governing Board want to bring the school up to the standards of our newer middle

schools including spatial, functional and contemporary issues.

Acacia Middle School is on a large site but lacks a gymnasium, has deteriorated locker rooms, shower rooms, library facilities, poorly functional classrooms and support facilities.

The Board selected PJHM Architects who have designed many of the District's schools to design

the upgrades and renovations using the approved master plan.

District staff and the Governing Board will be holding a similar master plan theme competition for selection of architects for Ramona Elementary School located at the corner of Whittier Avenue and Columbia Street and Little Lake Elementary School located at the corner of Acacia Avenue and Meridian Street.

District Matches Measure E Dollars with Over \$100 Million in State Funds

The District received \$101,294,786 in State School Building funds as a match to the \$60 million of Measure "E" funds.

The District received matching funds for both new construction and major repairs. 100% financial hardship funding for the acquisition and site improvement funds for Diamond Valley Middle School, McSweeny Elementary School and Tahquitz High School which included Rancho Viejo Middle School was received. □
